- No In-Person Worship & Gatherings As the deaths and infections from COVID 19 continue to escalate, on November 30 Bishop Jeremiah Park issued a statement urging all churches in the Susquehanna Conference to stop all indoor worship and activities. Bishop Park stated, "This is a very grave situation that requires a sacrificial response. For your safety and that of your friends, family, and neighbors, I, as bishop, along with the full Cabinet urge you to not conduct indoor in-person worship or gatherings for the rest of the year." Albright-Bethune is already functioning virtually and will continue to do so with our worship, administrative, and social activities until the pandemic eases.
- Church Conference The Albright-Bethune Annual Church Conference was held on November 29. Brenda Leigey, our State College district superintendent, conducted the conference via Zoom with the leaders of our congregation to provide a safe environment. - UMC Scholarships & Loans United Methodist Church high school seniors and those enrolled in college who are also active in their church and/or in the conference may apply for a Fall 2021 scholarship offered through the United Methodist General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Students must apply online between December 15–March 24 at https://www.gbhem.org/loans-and-scholarships/scholarships. Student loans are also available at low interest rates (with a credit worthy co-signer). Funds for these scholarships come from offerings taken on United Methodist Student Day, World Communion Sunday, and Native American Sunday. Please share this information with students who qualify for this support.
- New Denomination A group of progressive United Methodists and other Christians launched a new denomination named the Liberation Methodist Connexion, or LMX. The new church aims to center on the voices of people of color as well as queer and transgender individuals those the LMX organizers see as marginalized in The United Methodist Church. "We are a grassroots denomination of former, current, and non-Methodist faith leaders working on the unfolding of the kin-dom of God," the Connexion says on its website. "We intentionally invite the full participation of all who are living out their God-given identities and expressions." Organizers announced the new denomination's formation with an online worship service, presentation and after-party on November 29, the first Sunday of Advent and the start of the Christian year. The online gathering had more than 400 registrants. But because of technical difficulties, a number of those registrants were unable to log on, including United Methodist News. The new Connexion is getting off the ground after decades of intensifying debate within The United Methodist Church about how inclusive to be of LGBTQ Christians (From UM News).

- Christmas Giving You should now start thinking about making Christ a bigger part of your Christmas celebration. The *Christian Financial Concepts* newsletter recommends that we do some soul searching. This newsletter suggests that you decide the amount you plan to spend on gifts and then contribute 10% to Christ-like causes. For example, use the 10% to support food banks, orphans, and missions that spread the gospel in other nations.
- END OF EBOLA & MEASLES As Congo continues to battle COVID-19, The UMC is celebrating two wins: the end of both a second Ebola outbreak this year and a measles epidemic that killed more than 7,000 children. Several of the church's hospitals and clinics helped the government vaccinate children against measles and other diseases, especially in the most remote areas of the country. On Nov. 18, Congo's Minister of Health, Dr. Eteni Longondo, announced the end of an Ebola outbreak in Equateur Province, which was declared June 1. There were 55 deaths reported in the western Congo outbreak, which came on the heels of a nearly two-year outbreak in eastern Congo that killed more than 2,200 people. The end of the measles epidemic was declared Aug. 26. Congo has experienced recurrent measles epidemics for the past decade (From UM News By Chadrack Tambwe Londe).
- PECAN PIES Thanks to everyone who bought the genuine Southern pecan pies last month for this annual fund raiser. This year B. Evans Kitchen (aka Blannie) baked 48 pies in time for Thanksgiving. The pies and contributions generated over \$1,000 for our church.
- Christmas Symbols How much do you know about Christmas symbols? Bells were used in ancient Asian cultures to announce happy and sad occasions. The winter plant mistletoe dates to Scandinavia and a myth wherein an evil spirit was forbidden from killing his enemy. Candles were used by Martin Luther who decorated the first Christmas tree. Candy canes are used in the US to symbolize God's solid rock promises. Christmas cards date to ancient Egypt and Rome when they were carved in wood. Poinsettias are native to Mexico and symbolize the Star of Bethlehem. The plant is named for Joel Poinsett, the first US Ambassador to Mexico. Holly and ivy are used to represent the crown Jesus wore when he was crucified. Please remember the history of these symbols as we celebrate the birth of Jesus (From *UM Interpreter Magazine*, November-December 2000, p. 14-15).
- Church Zoom Meetings Do you miss seeing and hearing other Albright-Bethune members and worshippers? Well, our congregation holds weekly meetings on Wednesday nights from 7-8 p.m. using Zoom. This is an excellent opportunity to see and hear each other, socialize, and stay aware of church activities. An email is sent each week with the process for connecting. You can also participate by audio.
- Stress Reducers With the Christmas holidays approaching, now is a good time to reflect on an issue of *A Christian Perspective* newsletter that offered 7 ways to reduce stress and make your life more enjoyable. (1) Allow time everyday for privacy, quiet, and introspection. (2) When you face an unpleasant task, do it early in the day. (3) Delegate responsibility to capable individuals. (4) Take a lunch break to get away from your problems. (5) Count to 1,000 (not 10) before doing or saying something to make matters worse. (6) Have a forgiving view of events and people because we live in an imperfect world. (7) Have an optimistic outlook because most people do the best they can.

- ADVENT How much do you know about Advent which celebrates Christ's birth 2,020 years ago? Advent is derived from the Latin word *Adventus* which means coming. It begins on Sunday, November 29, and ends at sunset on Christmas Eve. Advent always includes four Sundays. The 1st Sunday marks the start of the Christian year and the final victory. The 2nd and 3rd Sundays represent John the Baptist while the 4th represents events preceding Jesus' birth. Traditional colors include purple which means royalty and is linked to penitence and Mary, Jesus' mother. Blue represents hope and white and gold represent joy and festivity. Christmas Eve is not part of Advent, but is the beginning of Christmas.
