- MENNONITE STUDY OF POLICE ABOLITION University Mennonite Church is hosting a 9-week study on the call for police abolition following a curriculum developed by the Mennonite Church USA. If you're interested in beginning or continuing to reflect on your commitment to nonviolence, what it means to engage the forces of state, and how to work to end policing and police brutality, this curriculum is for you. - Weaving Wisdom Project Albright-Bethune has agreed to partner with Grace Hampton on a community-based project that seeks to expand interactions across the generations. Dr. Hampton is a retired Penn State administrator and professor who is one of only 15 individuals who have been selected to receive the Gen2Gen Innovation Fellowship for innovators who are bridging generational divides. Each year, the Encore Foundation selects practical visionaries who have new ideas for putting generational connection and collaboration front and center in ways that benefit all ages. Dr. Hampton is the Co-founder of the Weaving Wisdom: Fabrics and The Stories They Tell project which seeks to enrich relationships between generations and cultures through traditional fabric arts. She will use her \$10,000 fellowship to support "Weaving Wisdom" which is a community-focused project designed to use the communicative power of the arts to increase communication between older adults and younger individuals. The project uses Kente and Adinkra cloths, American quilts, and basketry to show how cultural values, social norms, heritage, and the history of nations, communities, and families can be transmitted between generations. - FOOD DRIVE In December, our church partnered with the Penn State Black Graduate Student Association (BGSA) on a food drive for local residents. The students collected lots of food that was distributed from our church on December 11. All of the food that was not given away will be donated to the Food Bank. Thanks for everyone who donated food and assisted with the food drive.

- Christmas Eve Service Our Albright-Bethune Christmas Eve service was held at 6 p.m. on December 24. The service included a beautiful and joyful tradition of a candlelight Christmas Eve of lessons and carols about the wondrous good news of great joy in word and song. The service was held both in-person or on Facebook Live.
- Tornadoes United Methodists in Kentucky, Tennessee, and neighboring states are still coming to terms with the devastation of a string of tornadoes December 10-11, while also mobilizing to provide food, emergency shelter, and other relief. The storm system that struck included one tornado that caused destruction across 240 miles and is blamed for nearly 90 deaths. Two of those killed were Marsha Hall and Carole Grisham, sisters and members of Dawson Springs UMC in Kentucky. They were found among the rubble several houses from the one they shared in Dawson Springs. Twisters sheared roofs and shattered windows at some UM churches, parsonages, and congregation members' homes (From UM News).
- Boy Scout Settlement Negotiators for the UMC have reached a settlement to pay \$30 million as part of the Boy Scouts of America's bankruptcy reorganization plan. Local UMCs have long been leading sponsors of Boy Scout and Cub Scout troops, and the \$30 million is to be paid over three years into a trust fund for survivors of Scouting-related sexual abuse. All U.S. annual conferences are being asked to make a commitment to raise the necessary funds. The settlement comes after months of negotiations, and the bankruptcy plan still must be approved by a federal bankruptcy court (By Sam Hodges, UM News).
- Human Relations Day The UMC will celebrate Human Relations Day on January 16, and how will you help celebrate this important day? Turn on the news or drive around the outskirts of your town and you will find what Jesus called "the least of these." Those living in the margins of society, struggling to survive. People like:
 - An immigrant teenager in Texas' poorest county, being recruited by a local gang;
 - A father struggling for sobriety in Little Rock, Arkansas; and
 - An Oklahoma woman recently released from incarceration looking for work.

Over and over Jesus served and embraced people like these. And that's what we want to model as the people of the UMC. To continue the ministry of Jesus, the UMC established Human Relations Day as a Special Sunday and asks churches to help all of God's children realize their potential. - Souper Bowl Sunday If you watch the Super Bowl on February 13, think about sharing your snacks. In 1993, a single prayer led a senior high school youth group in Columbia, SC, to create a simple, yet powerful idea to fight hunger and poverty in their city. The Souper Bowl of Caring calls youth to action. And individuals, civic organizations, and schools are making a difference through this movement. Various religious groups, including the UMC, promote the concept of souper bowls to share food with the hungry. On this day, give to the Food Bank, share with individuals who are less fortunate, or make a special gift.
- General Conference Organizers are pressing forward with plans to hold a pivotal UMC General Conference this year. At the same time, they acknowledge that the pandemic may again thwart those plans. The Commission on the General Conference aims to decide in the first three months of 2022 whether the UMC's top legislative assembly can meet as scheduled August 29-September 6 in Minneapolis. In the meantime, the international elected body met online November 18 to continue preparations. Commission members also unanimously approved a list of values that will guide their decision to go forward or delay once again. The main obstacles to General Conference are travel visas and COVID vaccines. The assembly was to be held in 2020 but has been postponed twice (By Heather Hahn, UM News).

- UMC SCHOLARSHIPS & LOANS United Methodist Church high school seniors and those enrolled in college who are also active in their church and/or in the conference may apply for a Fall 2022 scholarship offered through the United Methodist General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Students must apply online between December 15–March 24 at https://www.gbhem.org/loans-and-scholarships/scholarships. Student loans are also available at low interest rates (with a credit worthy co-signer). Funds for these scholarships come from offerings taken on United Methodist Student Day, World Communion Sunday, and Native American Sunday. Please share this information with students who qualify for this support.
- AAUW SCHOLARSHIPS The AAUW State College Undergraduate Scholarships for Centre County Women application process is now open. AAUW will select four recipients for scholarships that range from \$3,000-\$7,000 depending on the financial need and circumstances of the recipients. Female adult learners enrolled for the 2022-23 academic year are encouraged to apply. Scholarship information and criteria for eligibility can be found at https://aauwstatecollege.org/scholarships. The application deadline is March 1.
