She had this big smile on her face and I was excited to see another black person. She gave me her contact and the Lord was reminding me of this community again. I'm laying this all out to say that this has been a journey in the making this entire time.

I am humbled to serve as your Pastor. I am double honored by the care and love that the community has poured into me already. Over the next hundred days, I want to spend some time with each of you to listen and learn your stories. I want us to learn each other's stories so we can start to build these bridges together. We want to create off and on-ramps throughout State College so people can find the resources they need from: The Word, a community/family, and Jesus the Christ.

I believe that each of us has the gifts and graces to bring the hope and healing of Jesus Christ to this area for the transformation of the World. I want to be in a relationship with each of you to understand your dreams and aspirations as well as your hurts. I know I was sent here to love you all and be with you during this time of COVID-19. - Retirement Postponed Our Susquehanna Conference Bishop Jeremiah Park had requested an early retirement to occur September 1, 2020. However, given the disruptions that COVID-19 has caused across the UMC, Bishop Park's retirement and that of other bishops have been postponed until after the UMC Jurisdictional Conferences in November 10-12, 2021.

- Buyer Be Aware Be Alert to Scammers Whenever there is a national disaster or national event in the US, you can be certain that scammers are scheming a new approach to separate you from your money. Scammers are persons who come up with fraudulent plans to get you to give them money for nothing of value in return. The coronavirus is presenting an opportunity for scammers to reach us because social distancing is keeping nearly everyone near a telephone. If you answer the phone and a scammer is on the other end, shift your brain into high gear and put up your guard!

Oftentimes, scammers play on emotions of generous or lonely folks who need someone to talk to. <u>AARP</u> has a list of 12 tricks scammers use. Two are worth mentioning:

- 1. Crooks often insist their targets keep silent about what they are being instructed to do.
- 2. Scammers excel at using flattery and charm to ingratiate themselves and gain your trust.

What can you do to avoid becoming the next victim of a clever scammer?

- 1. Hang up the phone. Don't talk to them.
- 2. Don't answer the phone if they call back immediately.
- 3. If you answer the phone and a scammer is on the end, tell them to hold on for a second and put the phone down before they answer. Then wait about 15 to 20 minutes and return to hang up the phone. They will hang up and go on to their next target. Repeat this process each time they call back and they will likely look for another target quickly. After all, when you waste their time, they are decreasing the chance of gaining a victim.

## Meet Pastor Paul Ryan McReynolds (Appointment Effective July 1, 2020)



ITC -Gammon Theological Seminary

Paul Ryan McReynolds was born in Santa Ana, CA, to John and Evangeline McReynolds. He was raised in the largest African American church, Second Baptist Church of Santa Ana, CA, where his father was the Pastor for nearly 30 years. He found his passion for music at an early age as a singer and musician. He served as lead drummer for SBC for over 19 years and singer in the youth and young adult choir. He preached his first sermon on the second Sunday in November 2011. From 2008-2013, he worked as a first responder in West Hollywood, CA, and as an EMT with the Los Angeles County Fire Department.

Paul left California and traveled to Marshall in East Texas to attend The Wiley College on a music scholarship. He was afforded the opportunity to sing with the world renowned A Cappella Choir of Wiley College under the direction of Maestro Dr. Stephen L Hayes. He was granted the chance to record with the Sounds of Blackness and recorded a cover of the *To Be Young Gifted and Black* with his sister, Melissa. He also sang at the White House and on singing tours around the country. In 2014, he was selected to sing in Japan in Tokyo and Hiroshima for the International Association of Methodist Schools, Colleges, and Universities (IAMSCU). He served as a campus minister from 2013-2016 under the direction of Rev. Tabitha Rankin. In 2015, he became a United Methodist and a member of Ebenezer UMC. On November 16, 2013, he was initiated in the greatest fraternity (Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.) and the Alpha Sigma Chapter, the 39<sup>th</sup> House of Alpha. He was selected to participate in the Rho class of the Alpha Leadership Academy in 2014. He served the Texas Council of Alpha Chapters in 2013-14 as Assistant District Secretary and Assistant District Director in 2015-2016. He also served on the Southwestern Regional Board in 2013-2016.

Paul graduated from Wiley College on May 7, 2016. He is now a student at The Gammon Theological Seminary in Atlanta which is part of the Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC) which is a Christian Africentric ecumenical consortium of seminaries. He is the grandson of Arthur McReynolds who also attended Gammon and became the first Black Elder in Chattanooga, TN. He is a Pastoral Intern and serves as Youth Pastor at Conyers First UMC. Since attending Gammon, he serves as the Student Fellowship President. Paul is a graduating senior and is pursuing his M-Div at the ITC where his concentration is Homiletics and Pastoral Care. Paul is striving for ordained ministry as an Elder in the United Methodist Church. He is an avid reader and loves music and spending time watching movies. His motto is Simplicity is the Ultimate Sophistication.
