# From Pastor Paul's Desk......

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, the Healer of the Soul, and our everlasting Redeemer. I am so excited about what the Lord has in store for us at Albright-Bethune. We have an amazing opportunity to be a bridge in the community by mending their souls with the word. Engaging their hearts in stewardship and prayer. Family, I pray all is well with you and your families. As we are moving ever closer to Easter and the spring around the corner, I want us to remain in the season of prayer. <u>Psalm 130:5-6</u> - I wait for the Lord, my whole being waits, and in his word, I put my hope. • **G**RADUATION EXERCISES - Congratulations to Pastor Paul McReynolds who participated in Gammon Theological Seminary's 61<sup>st</sup> Commencement Exercises celebrating the Class of 2020 that was held on February 27. Gammon Theological Seminary, located in Atlanta, GA, is the United Methodist constituent member of the Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC). Pastor McReynolds completed his Master of Divinity degree in Theology at Gammon. His graduation exercise was delayed last year because of the pandemic. Please extend congratulations to Pastor Paul.

• **N-PERSON WORSHIP** - Bishop Jeremiah Park has issued advice, guidelines, and recommendations for churches to resume in-person worship and other activities. He has recommended that each church form a team of lay and clergy that will learn about the virus and safety practices in order to develop a plan for the church. Our Albright-Bethune Administrative Council will function as the team for our church. The Conference says that vaccination, mask wearing, and social distancing are critical to churches holding in-person activities. Given the age of our congregation and because so many members and worshippers have underlying heath conditions, getting a vaccine is critical for our church to resume inperson worship and activities. If you have not already received the vaccine, please do so when you become eligible and it is available. Our church plans to survey our members and worshippers to determine how many have been vaccinated or plan to get a vaccine so we can decide when to resume in-person worship. Please see Pastor McReynolds or Jackie Peagler, our Administrative Council Chair, if you have questions about resuming in-person activities.

• LENTEN STUDY - Albright-Bethune is participating in a Lenten study using UMC Bishop Sharma Lewis' best-selling *Journey to Transformation: 2021 Lenten Study Paperback.* You can purchase the book from Amazon for \$16.95. The book is structured to correspond to each day during Lent with a devotional for individual or group study. Bishop Lewis is from the Virginia UMC Conference and she invites readers to observe Lent by introspection, repentance, forgiveness, renewal, prayer, fasting, and Biblical Study. *A Journey to Transformation* is divided into four sections: Lenten Devotional, Prayer, Reflection, and My Action. • **CONDOLENCES** - Last month the Bowen family experienced the death of Betty Lee Bowen Boney who was Blannie's last aunt. She died in North Carolina at age 91 after a long and fulfilling life. She was very active in her church community and with their family farm until her health started to decline over the last few years. • **NOTHING BUT NETS –** Since 2006, the UMC has been fighting malaria as a founding partner of a group called *Nothing But Nets*. The UMC, the United Nations Foundation, and various partners have built this grassroots movement to end malaria and over 13 million bed nets have been sent to families in Africa. Just \$10 buys a bed net, distributes it to a family, and provides education on how to use it. The partners have raised over \$70 million. • **G**ENERAL CONFERENCE POSTPONED AGAIN - Meeting on February 20, the Commission on the UMC General Conference decided to further postpone the 2020 General Conference until August 29 – September 6, 2022 in Minneapolis, MN, as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to affect the safety of mass gatherings and travel. It is the Commission's responsibility to select the site and set the dates of General Conference. Further, the *Book of Discipline* requires the Commission on the General Conference to "take necessary measures to assure full participation of all General Conference delegates." The Commission concluded that mandate was not achievable by means of either an in-person meeting in 2021 or a virtual meeting. In making the decision, the Commission determined that it was not feasible to safely hold an inperson meeting involving all delegates as currently scheduled for August 29 - September 7, 2021 due to a number of barriers, especially the pandemic.

• **SABBATICALS FOR PASTORS** - Bishop Jeremiah Park and the Cabinet of our Central Pennsylvania Conference recently thanked all pastors for their dedication, persistence, and bravery during the pandemic. Most of these pastors still face challenges, hardships, and stresses that impact their ability to function on the desired level. Consequently, Bishop Park is recommending that each pastor take a sabbatical and some time away from their obligations. He is recommending that a guest preacher deliver the sermon for them one Sunday each month for the next 4-5 months. This approach will enable the pastors to recharge and recover from the stresses that they have faced during the pandemic. Many of these pastors have had to conduct funerals, memorial services, and virtual comfort sessions for their members and worshippers.

• **UMC SCHOLARSHIPS & LOANS -** UMC high school seniors and college students who are active in their church and/or in the conference may apply for a Fall 2021 scholarship offered through the United Methodist General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Students must apply online before March 24 at <a href="https://www.gbhem.org/loans-and-scholarships/scholarships">https://www.gbhem.org/loans-and-scholarships/scholarships</a>. Student loans are also available at low interest rates. Funds for these scholarships come from offerings on UMC Student Day, World Communion Sunday, and Native American Sunday.

• **HISTORIC CHURCH** - The Cleveland Restoration Society announced recently that Cory United Methodist Church will be the site of an Ohio historical marker describing its significance in the civil rights movement. The church, housed in a former synagogue, hosted speeches by the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. and Malcolm X (From UM News). • **FINANCE CORNER -** Each month the amount our church collects via offerings is posted in this section of the newsletter. ### Penn State VITA-Volunteer Income Tax Assistance

If you need help completing your 2020 tax return and your total income is \$56,000 or less, you can get the return completed and filed electronically for free at Penn State VITA. Because of the pandemic, the site is totally drop-off/pick-up. In short, you will leave your tax documents and return at a later date to pick up your file c opy and grant permission to file it electronically.
