- PRESENTATION On April 19, Mark Dyreson made a presentation for Juniata College faculty, staff, and students entitled *Pioneering "Black Mercuries": The First African American Olympians and Their Progenies, 1896-1936.* Mark's presentation focused on some of the pioneers of the Olympics as well as the cultural, racial, and political conditions of the times. - Special Charge Conference On March 30, District Superintendent Brenda Leigey held a special church charge conference to discuss the future of our church including in person worship and developing a stronger online presence. Rev. Gary Shockley, the Director of Equipping Vital Congregations for our UMC Susquehanna Conference, was also on the Zoom conference. Several of our leaders, members, and worshippers participated. The specifics about plans for moving forward will be released when they are finalized.
- Mother's Day Greece gave birth to Mother's Day, but the mother of Mother's Day in the US was Ann Marie Reeves Jarvis, the wife of a West Virginia Methodist pastor. Her daughter, Anna, led a campaign to have Mother's Day become a national holiday. Anna heard her mother express hope that a memorial would be established for mothers, living and dead. After her father's death in 1902, Anna, her mother, and sister moved to Philadelphia. After Ann's death in 1905, Anna began a drive to fulfill her mother's wish. On May 10, 1908, a program was held at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton and in Philadelphia, launching a memorial day for mothers. The church later observed Mother's Day on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday each year making Andrews the mother church of Mother's Day. The church, no longer an active Methodist congregation, was incorporated as an international shrine in 1962. Mother's Day will be celebrated in 2021 on May 9 (From UM News Service).
- Homeless Ministry in Kenya United Methodists in Kenya are helping homeless women and children overcome the challenges exacerbated by COVID-19. The initial goal of the Homeless Compassion Ministry, a program of the Nairobi District, was to identify a few children who were homeless or at-risk of becoming homeless due to the worsening living conditions of parents and guardians residing in slums. The Rev. Patrick Wandera, senior pastor at Kayole St. John United Methodist Church, said the ministry assists neglected, needy, orphaned, vulnerable, deprived, and destitute children and youth ages 3 to 15. Most are from the Kayole-Soweto slums in Nairobi. Wandera is grateful for the Rev. Ronald McCant, a retired United Methodist elder from Florida, who currently provides monthly food and education support for seven homeless children. Due to the pandemic, however, the number of homeless children served has increased to 30, threatening the program's sustainability (From UM News by Gad Maiga).

- Greenhouse Gas Emissions Eleven general agencies of The United Methodist Church are pledging to achieve net-zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050 across ministries, facilities, operations, and investments. The initiative was announced on Earth Day. Net-zero emissions means the amount of human-produced greenhouse gas emissions does not exceed the amount taken out of the atmosphere, according to the World Resources Institute. Greenhouse gas removal is achieved by tactics such as restoring forests or direct air capture and storage. The agencies committed to the goal are the United Methodist Board of Church and Society, Board of Global Ministries, Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Commission on Archives and History, Commission on the Status and Role of Women, Communications, Council on Finance and Administration, Discipleship Ministries, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, and Wespath Benefits and Investments (From UM News, Jim Patterson).
- VACCINATIONS & IN-PERSON WORSHIP Given the age of our congregation and because so many members and worshippers have underlying heath conditions, getting a vaccine is critical for our church to resume in-person worship and activities. If you have not already received a vaccine, please do so when you become eligible, and one is available. Our church is tracking how many have been vaccinated or plan to get a vaccine to decide when to resume in-person activities. - Annual Conference Bishop Jeremiah Park announced recently that the Susquehanna Conference 2021 Annual Conference has been rescheduled for June 18-19 and will be held virtually. Bishop Park said that they will worship and conduct only essential business out of an abundance of caution for what is best for clergy and lay members.
- Ascension Day Did you know that, as promised, Jesus appeared to His disciples 40 days after his crucifixion? Christians traditionally celebrate His ascension into heaven on the 40<sup>th</sup> day of Easter (May 13 in 2021). This event is followed by the Day of Pentecost to celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit in whose power this happens.
- Father's Day We will celebrate Father's Day on June 20. In 1909, Mrs. Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, WA, proposed the idea of the "Father's Day" to honor her father, William Smart. Mr. Smart, a Civil War veteran, raised his six children by himself on a farm after his wife died in childbirth with their 6<sup>th</sup> child. The idea came when she heard a sermon about the merits of setting aside a day to honor one's mother. It gave her the idea to petition for a day to honor fathers and, in particular, her own father. With support from the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA, her efforts paid off. On June 19, 1910, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge supported the idea of a national Father's Day, but it was not until 1966 when President Lyndon Johnson signed a proclamation declaring the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of June as Father's Day. This day has become a time to not only honor your father, but all men who act as father figures. Stepfathers, uncles, grandfathers, and adult male friends are all honored on Father's Day. - Pentecost Pentecost is derived from the Greek word "pentekost" meaning 50<sup>th.</sup> It is commemorative of the descent of the Holy Ghost on the apostles. It is held 50 days after Easter and 10 days after Christ's ascension. In 2021, Pentecost will be celebrated on May 23. The Jews also celebrated 50 days after Passover in a feast called Pentecost.
