From the Pastor's Desk



Change is coming!

This time of the year, many people including my wife, Kadie, and I look forward to the beauty of God's creation as changes occur in nature. The beauty of God's handiwork is clearly visible in the trees and leaves around us.

Summer is full of activities and events. It is the time when humanity goes crazy with travels, celebrations, and you name it. It's the season when people are full of life.

With all of the events and activities that go on during summer, we are never to forget that there are other seasons. The Hebrew scripture clearly reminds us that everything has its season and time. The bible emphasizes that: "Everything on earth has its own time and its own season." Ecclesiastes 3:1.

As Kadie and I sit at home and watch nature evolve, we see little yellow leaves from the trees in our yard dance as they fall off the branches. It seems they fall almost as quickly as they change from green to yellow. I love the season of summer affectionately and part of me always longs to whisper to the trees, "Hold on for a little longer. Come on; you got this. Think green!" But graciously, the trees listen to their maker rather than my longings. In order to flourish in the new season, the trees must let go of its decayed leaves. This web series followed 13 young people at a new genetics and genealogy camp as they used science to answer the question "Who am I?" - Stress Reducers With the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays approaching, now is a good time to reflect on an issue of A Christian Perspective newsletter that offered 7 ways to reduce stress and make your life more enjoyable. (1) Allow time everyday for privacy, quiet, and introspection. (2) When you face an unpleasant task, do it early in the day. (3) Delegate responsibility to capable individuals. (4) Take a lunch break to get away from your problems. (5) Count to 1,000 (not 10) before doing or saying something to make matters worse. (6) Have a forgiving view of events and people because we live in an imperfect world. (7) Have an optimistic outlook because most people do the best they can.
- ADVENT How much do you know about Advent which celebrates Christ's birth 2,019 years ago? Advent is derived from the Latin word *Adventus* which means coming. It begins on Sunday, December 1, and ends at sunset on Christmas Eve. Advent always includes four Sundays. The 1st Sunday marks the start of the Christian year and the final victory. The 2nd and 3rd Sundays represent John the Baptist while the 4th represents events preceding Jesus' birth. Traditional colors include purple which means royalty and is linked to penitence and Mary, Jesus' mother. Blue represents hope and white and gold represent joy and festivity. Christmas Eve is not part of Advent, but is the beginning of Christmas.

- Fall Options Try the following to make your transition from summer to fall more enjoyable. Go outdoors to experience God's creation and watch the leaves change colors. Have a class outside, take a hike, go on a picnic, or pick-up litter in a park or along a roadside. Try a weekend of camping at nearby sites such as Shaver's Creek or Black Moshannon. Also, volunteer to take children to recreational areas. These are excellent opportunities to teach children about the creation stories in Genesis or other Biblical texts.
- Parking Monday-Friday from 6:30 am to 6:30 pm individuals rent some of our church's parking spaces. Please **do not** park in the spaces during these hours. Also, to stop students from using the spaces 24 hours a day, the parking lot is being patrolled and unauthorized vehicles will be ticketed. During Sunday worship, the lot **is not** patrolled and nobody is ticketed. If church activities require you to park for extended periods **other than during worship**, contact Cathy Bowen to get a **free** parking sticker for your vehicle.
- EACH ONE, BRING ONE! Some individuals are seeking a church home to have a fulfilling religious experience. Take the time to share your worship experiences and then bring one of these individuals to church with you. Next, nurture and keep that person involved in our church. Don't underestimate the impact that you can have if each one of us brings only one new person into our congregation. If each Albright-Bethune member and worshipper brings only one new person into our church family, we can begin a serious growth mode. - Christmas Giving You should now start thinking about making Christ a bigger part of your Christmas celebration. The *Christian Financial Concepts* newsletter recommends that we do some soul searching. This newsletter suggests that you decide the amount you plan to spend on gifts and then contribute 10% to Christ-like causes. For example, use the 10% to support food banks, orphans, and missions that spread the gospel in other nations.
