• **EAGLE SCOUT** Celebration – The national organization of Scouting, BSA (formerly Boy Scouts of America), has approved Alexandra (Zan) Dyreson to receive the rank of Eagle Scout. BSA. Troop 328 of Boalsburg invites you to her Court of Honor that is scheduled for 2 p.m. on Sunday, November 14, at Albright-Bethune for the presentation of her Eagle Scout Badge, Zan's Eagle Scout Service Project was the creation of a Civil Rights Heritage Garden in the front of our church. Her project included the repainting and repair of the old, dilapidated church sign, planting foliage with a Pan-African color scheme, and engraving garden stones with symbols from the struggle for African-American civil rights. The new garden outdoor space now reflects the warm and diverse nature of the congregation and considerably brightens a busy and highly visible corner of downtown. Although subject to fall seasonal changes, the Garden will be on display at the Court of Honor for those who would like to see some of the results of her Eagle project. Zan recently graduated valedictorian with a 4.08 GPA from Juniata Valley High School and attends the Schreyer Honors College at Penn State. She was the drum major for her high school marching band and played trombone in its concert band and qualified for both the Pennsylvania Music Educators' Association District and Regional Bands and Choruses and the Tournament of Bands All-Star Marching Band and now plays for Penn State's Pep Band. • Foundation BOARD MEMBER - The United Methodist Foundation of Western Pennsylvania (Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference) and The United Methodist Stewardship Foundation (Susquehanna Annual Conference) have agreed to merge. **Cathy Bowen** has agreed to serve on the board of the newly formed foundation, effective October 1. An orientation meeting for this board was held September 29. The foundation's role will be to complement and reinforce the stewardship ministries of the UM churches, agencies, and programs primarily in Pennsylvania. • **MPACT OF PANDEMIC -** Hartford (CT) Seminary has been awarded a five-year, \$5.3 million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. to fund research into how congregations are changing, innovating, and establishing new ministry practices because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Hartford Institute for Religion Research will assist the Faith Communities Today project as it tracks the pandemic's effects on churches. United Methodist Communications, a member of Faith Communities Today, will be inviting United Methodist leaders and members to participate in the study (From the UM News Service - <u>Read press release</u>).

• **C**ENTRE COUNTY ENCYCLOPEDIA - The Centre County Encyclopedia of History & Culture is an online resource sponsored by the Centre County Historical Society. The mission of the encyclopedia is to share reliable and current information about significant events, people, places, and things in Centre County's rich history. To do that, the group collaborates with local contributors, uses the latest technology, and adds new resources. **Mark Dyreson** and **Blannie Bowen**, two of our worshippers, recently wrote articles for the encyclopedia. One of Mark's articles featured Norwood H. "Barney" Ewell who thrilled track spectators from State College to London's Wembley Stadium where he won three medals at the 1948 Olympics. Ewell won numerous titles in the sprints and long jump while representing Penn State. Blannie wrote an article about Ralph Dorn Hetzel , who was Penn State's president from 1926 to 1947. The encyclopedia is evolving and new entries and materials will be added regularly to make it a valuable resource about Centre County. • LAITY SUNDAY - Our congregation celebrated Laity Sunday on October 17. Several members and worshippers helped to conduct our worship service. Braden Dyreson was the speaker and he delivered an excellent, inspirational message. Thanks to everyone who helped conduct the service. Laity Sunday is an invitation for the whole church to remember that all of the baptized, lay, and clergy together are the people of God. Our English word "laity" comes from the Greek word "laos" meaning, "people."

• STRESS REDUCERS - With the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays approaching, now is a good time to reflect on an issue of A Christian Perspective newsletter that offered 7 ways to reduce stress and make your life more enjoyable. (1) Allow time everyday for privacy, quiet, and introspection. (2) When you face an unpleasant task, do it early in the day. (3) Delegate responsibility to capable individuals. (4) Take a lunch break to get away from your problems. (5) Count to 1,000 (not 10) before doing or saying something to make matters worse. (6) Have a forgiving view of events and people because we live in an imperfect world. (7) Have an optimistic outlook because most people do the best they can.

• **FALL OPTIONS** - Try the following to make your transition from summer to fall more enjoyable. Go outdoors to experience God's creation and watch the leaves begin to change colors. Have a class outside, take a hike, go on a picnic, or pick-up litter in a park or along a roadside. Try a weekend of camping at nearby sites such as Shaver's Creek or Black Moshannon. Also, volunteer to take children to recreational areas. These are excellent opportunities to teach children about the creation stories in Genesis or other Biblical texts.

• **PASTOR COMPENSATION DISPARITY** - Compensation for women clergy in the UMC continues to trail that of their male peers, according to a new study, despite progress in many annual conferences. In the US, United Methodist women pastors made 8.2% less than their male counterparts in 2020, and there are far more male clergy than female in the denomination. Men make up 68.1% and women 31.9% of all United Methodist clergy. The second of three batches of information from the study (<u>"2020 Geographic Trends of Gender Disparities in Composition and Compensation for UMC Clergy</u>") was released October 27. The research was conducted by <u>Magaela C. Bethune</u>, assistant professor of African American Studies at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles. "Despite the trend of women constituting over half of The United Methodist Church membership, women are significantly underrepresented among active, full-time United Methodist Church clergy and are paid significantly less than UMC clergymen," Bethune said in the report. • ADVENT - How much do you know about Advent which celebrates Christ's birth 2,021 years ago? Advent is derived from the Latin word *Adventus* which means coming. It begins on Sunday, November 28, and ends at sunset on Christmas Eve. Advent always includes four Sundays. The 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday marks the start of the Christian year and the final victory. The 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sundays represent John the Baptist while the 4<sup>th</sup> represents events preceding Jesus' birth. Traditional colors include purple which means royalty and is linked to penitence and Mary, Jesus' mother. Blue represents hope and white and gold represent joy and festivity. Christmas Eve is not part of Advent, but is the beginning of Christmas.

• **CHRISTMAS GIVING** – You should now start thinking about making Christ a bigger part of your Christmas celebration. The *Christian Financial Concepts* newsletter recommends that we do some soul searching. This newsletter suggests that you decide the amount you plan to spend on gifts and then contribute 10% to Christ-like causes. For example, use the 10% to support food banks, orphans, and missions that spread the gospel in other nations.
