- LAITY SUNDAY Our congregation will celebrate Laity Sunday on October 18. Members and worshippers will help conduct our virtual worship service. Laity Sunday is an invitation for the whole church to remember that all of the baptized, lay, and clergy together are the people of God. Our English word "laity" comes from the Greek word "laos" meaning, "people." Please plan to join this special service and invite a friend, relative, or colleague.
- MEETINGS WITH PASTOR MCREYNOLDS During his first 100 days, Rev. McReynolds wants to meet in person (via phone/Zoom) with every member, worshipper, and family. This meeting is to get to know you and gain your perspectives. Several emails have been sent about scheduling a meeting. If you have not already replied, please check your inbox. - COVID VACCINE TESTING Photos of two Black men graced the sanctuary of First Grace UMC in New Orleans as the Rev. Shawn Moses Anglim spoke during "a little children's moment" in recent Sunday services. The two church members pictured, Dillard University President Walter Kimbrough and pediatrician Dr. Ted Atkinson, were lifted up as role models for the children because they are participating in a COVID-19 vaccine study at Ochsner Medical Center in New Orleans. Mistrust of the medical community has resulted in a shortage of African Americans willing to be research subjects. This could undermine the effectiveness of any vaccine developed to fight the coronavirus. "Everybody in the world is suddenly connected," Anglim said in an interview with United Methodist News. "We all need this vaccination, and we need our medical community to develop it." Kimbrough and Atkinson inspired Anglim, who is white, to also volunteer to test the vaccine. In a joint open letter to the communities of Dillard and Xavier University of Louisiana, Kimbrough and Xavier President C. Reynold Verret appealed to students, faculty, and staff to consider participating in the study. Dillard and Xavier are historically Black universities. Dillard is one of 11 historically Black schools supported by The Black College Fund of the UMC (From UM News).

- Church Zoom Meetings Do you miss seeing and hearing other Albright-Bethune members and worshippers? Well, our congregation holds weekly meetings on Wednesday nights from 7-8 p.m. using Zoom. Given the uncertainty of the pandemic, the meetings will continue. This is an excellent opportunity to see and hear each other, socialize, and stay aware of church activities. - RELIGION & RACISM Jesus calls his followers to love their neighbor. So why have Christians found ways to refuse their neighbors not just love but basic dignity? "We know better," said the Rev. Mai-Anh Le Tran of UMC Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, IL. "Why don't we act or live differently? It strikes me as that we are still befuddled by our human fallibility." For an hour, she and two other theologians wrestled with why racism remains prevalent in the U.S., where Christianity is the dominant faith. They spoke as part of The UMC's fourth online panel held to discuss eradicating racial injustice. The Sept. 16 panel discussion came a day after Barna released new research showing an increasing percentage of practicing Christians who say they are "unmotivated" or "not at all motivated" to address racial injustice. Barna found that percentage grew from 17% in 2019 to 30% this year, even after the deaths of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery, and Breonna Taylor and the shooting of Jacob Blake drew international attention, and news spread that COVID-19 is disproportionately killing ethnic minorities, including children. The same survey found that nearly one in five practicing Christians say that race is "not at all" a problem in the U.S. Erin Hawkins, the panel's moderator, pointed to research by PRRI (Public Religion Research Institute) that focused on white Christians in the U.S. "White Christians are consistently more likely than whites who are religiously unaffiliated to deny the existence of structural racism," wrote Robert P. Jones, PRRI's founder, for NBC News. Such data did not surprise the theologians on the panel (From UM News).
- November 3 Election Senator Bob Casey says that voting is a pillar of our democracy and our civic duty as citizens. He wants to make sure you have the resources you need to vote, vote early, and vote safely. Senator Casey says that no matter who you plan to vote for, you can help PA elections run smoothly and make sure your voice is heard by making a plan now for how you're going to vote. He emphasizes that voting by mail is a safe, secure, and legal way to practice your constitutional right to vote. Any qualified voter may apply for a mail-in ballot. Tuesday, October 27, is the deadline to request your mailin or absentee ballot. Also, to ensure your ballot is counted, don't wait to send your ballot in, as ballots must be postmarked by 8 PM on Tuesday, November 3, and received by your county election office by 5 PM on Friday, November 6. He said that if you are concerned about USPS delays in delivering mail-in or absentee ballots, you can drop off your ballot at your county election office. Senator Casey said to be sure to double-check all deadlines at VOTESPA.com or call 1-877-VOTESPA to ensure that you have the most up-to-date information. You must also carefully follow the directions on your mail-in ballot, or your vote will not be counted. This includes marking your ballot in blue or black pen, sealing your ballot in the inner secrecy envelope that says "official ballot" and then placing it in the outer return envelope, sealing it, and signing it. Senator Casey requests that you contact his office at https://www.casey.senate.gov/contact if you have any questions about voting or the election.

- FALL OPTIONS Try the following to make your transition from summer to fall more enjoyable. Go outdoors to experience God's creation and watch the leaves begin to change colors. Have a class outside, take a hike, go on a picnic, or pick-up litter in a park or along a roadside. Try a weekend of camping at nearby sites such as Shaver's Creek or Black Moshannon. These are excellent opportunities to teach children about the creation stories in Genesis or other Biblical texts.

In April, this section covered tips for emergency plans. I am revisiting this topic as it seems a missing component of that article was emergency cash or access to money. Many of us have gotten so comfortable using plastic money (credit and debit cards) and other forms of electronic means (e.g., Cash App and Venmo) to spend money that we rarely have any real cash in our pockets. This is a reminder that when all else fails, cash is the lowest common denominator that may make your life a little easier if electronic money systems are down in our region or the entire country.
