- THANKS FROM THE AMARAS Pastor Paul and Kadie Amara continue to adjust to Williamsport and their new surroundings. They said that words are not enough to express their sincere thanks to all for your love and care of their family while they were in State College. Also, they said that knowing you has been a great blessing for their family.
- Hurricane Laura Rev. Angela Cooley Bulhof evacuated with her family to Houston ahead of Hurricane Laura, but word reached her quickly that her church, University UMC in Lake Charles, LA, took a big hit from the powerful storm. A handful of other UMC buildings in southwest Louisiana, including University UMC's satellite campus, were damaged to varying degrees. Louisiana Conference Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey expressed gratitude that the hurricane caused less storm surge flood damage than had been feared. Hurricane Laura brought winds of up to 150 miles an hour as it made landfall along southwest Louisiana and southeast Texas on August 27. Laura is blamed for 17 deaths and left thousands without power. Aerial photos confirmed the devastation around Lake Charles, including destroyed homes and businesses. UMC clergy in that city and elsewhere in southwest Louisiana joined other residents in evacuating before the hurricane and were scrambling from afar to get reports on their churches and residences. Bulhof shared photos of badly damaged homes of University UMC staff and members. She had an encouraging early report on her home but knew that the Day School of University UMC was clobbered, and that church campus damage was widespread generally (By Sam Hodges, UM News).
- Women's Right to Vote Crowds jammed into the Tennessee state capitol on a hot August morning in 1920 for what all expected to be a momentous day. The question on everyone's mind: How would the Tennessee legislators vote on U.S. women's right to vote? Ratification of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution required 36 states' approval, and 35 states were already in hand. However, ratification was far from assured. Most of Tennessee's southern neighbors had rejected the measure. The state's legislature faced pressure to do the same and begin sounding the amendment's death knell. Suffragists in the gallery that morning knew that only 47 of the 96 legislators present were committed to their cause. They had little hope that eastern Tennessee Rep. Harry T. Burn, the state's youngest legislator at age 24, would join their ranks. The suffragists could see that Burn's lapel bore a red rose, a symbol of opposition to the women's vote. What they could not see was the letter in his pocket - carrying advice from his Methodist mother. "Dear Son: Hurrah, and vote for suffrage!" Phoebe "Febb" Burn wrote from the town of Niota, Tennessee, where she attended what is now Niota United Methodist Church. "Don't keep them in doubt." Her son's sudden "aye" tied the vote and emboldened fellow legislator Banks Turner to give the decisive 49th assent. Thus, Tennessee secured women citizens a voice in their nation's democracy, including in that year's presidential election (By Heather Hahn, UM News).

- 1. Use the link on the <u>church website</u> to donate online. You can (a) send the same predetermined amount on the same day each week or month or (b) give sporadically whatever amount you like.
- 2. You can also download the **GIVE** + (Give Plus) app that is associated with **Vanco** and send money from your smart phone whenever you like. When donors are logged into their **Give** + account, they can review their giving history, and manage recurring donations.

An advantage of using **Vanco** is you receive confirmation of each donation and have easy access to a yearly record of your giving.

### Cash App

Download **Cash App** from your smartphone App Store and search for *\$albrightbethune* to donate. You will receive a text message from Cathy Bowen to acknowledge that your donation has been received.
